Amen.

Reflection: Let us hear the record of God's saving deeds in history, and pray that each of us may receive the fullness of this grace. Let us reflect upon God's grace and glory.

Israel's Deliverance at the Red Sea

The ruler who kept God's people in slavery pursues them to the Red Sea as they try to escape. Despite a hopeless situation, God rescues God's people, leading them on dry land through the parted sea and closing the waters on their former masters. Miriam then sings a song about God's marvelous deliverance.

As Pharaoh drew near, the Israelites looked back, and there were the Egyptians advancing on them. In great fear the Israelites cried out to the Lord. They said to Moses, "Was it because there were no graves in Egypt that you have taken us away to die in the wilderness? What have you done to us, bringing us out of Egypt? Is this not the very thing we told you in Egypt, 'Let us alone and let us serve the Egyptians'? For it would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness." But Moses said to the people, "Do not be afraid, stand firm, and see the deliverance that the Lord will accomplish for you today; for the Egyptians whom you see today you shall never see again. The Lord will fight for you, and you have only to keep still."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "Why do you cry out to me? Tell the Israelites to go forward. But you lift up your staff, and stretch out your hand over the sea and divide it, that the Israelites may go into the sea on dry ground. Then I will harden the hearts of the Egyptians so that they will go in after them; and so I will gain glory for myself over Pharaoh and all his army, his chariots, and his chariot drivers. And the Egyptians shall know that I am the Lord, when I have gained glory for myself over Pharaoh, his chariots, and his chariot drivers."

The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night.

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left. The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, "Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers." So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left.

Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Then the prophet Miriam, Aaron's sister, took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them: "Sing to the Lord, for he has triumphed gloriously; horse and rider he has thrown into the sea."

(Exodus 14:10-31; 15:20-21 NRSV*)

Salvation Offered Freely to All

The prophet Isaiah issues an invitation of abundant life to the hungry and thirsty.

Ho, everyone who thirsts, come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price. Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good, and delight yourselves in rich food. Incline your ear, and come to me; listen, so that you may live. I will make with you an everlasting covenant, my steadfast, sure love for David. See, I made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander for the peoples. See, you shall call nations that you do not know, and nations that do not know you shall run to you, because of the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has glorified you.

Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. (Isaiah 55:1-11 NRSV*)

Creator of all things, you freely offer water to the thirsty and food to the hungry. Refresh us by the water of baptism and feed us with the bread and wine of your table, that your Word may bear fruit in our lives, and bring us all to your heavenly banquet; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

A New Heart and a New Spirit

The prophet promises that God will renew God's people. God will replace their heart of stone with a new heart.

I will take you from the nations, and gather you from all the countries, and bring you into your own land. I will sprinkle clean water upon you, and you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses, and from all your idols I will cleanse you. A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. I will put my spirit within you, and make you follow my statutes and be careful to observe my ordinances. Then you shall live in the land that I gave to your ancestors; and you shall be my people, and I will be your God. (Ezekiel 36:24-28 NRSV*)

God of holiness and light, in the mystery of dying and rising with Christ you have established a new covenant of reconciliation. Cleanse our hearts and give a new spirit to all your people, that your saving grace may be made known to the whole world; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Buried and Raised with Christ in Baptism

The apostle Paul reminds us that in Christ we have already died, drowned in baptism. Yet we who have died are raised to newness of life.

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus. (Romans 6:3-11 NRSV*)

Sermon: Our Gospel reading for today comes from the Gospel according to Matthew, chapter 28, verses 1 through 10.

After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' This is my message for you." So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said, "Greetings!" And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshiped him. Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me." (Matthew 28:1-10 NRSV*)

This is the word of God for the people of God. Thanks be to God.

One phrase kept pulling me back this week, and I think it is because of everything going on. I could just give a normal Easter message today. Pretend that everything is normal and just give an Easter sermon that doesn't look at where we are right now. But that would be ignoring everything that's happened over the last few weeks and what will continue in the weeks to come. I can't help but

look at this through the lens of now. What is it we need to hear right now? And that is exactly what we find in today's reading from Matthew. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to the tomb. They are looking for Jesus. They were looking for answers. And it was the poignant answer they got at the empty tomb. He is not here. That answer stuck with me. Saying it in this empty church gives it a new meaning. HE IS NOT HERE. HE IS RISEN! It rings out. It echoes. For the two Marys it was a marked statement that the thing they were coming to lament was no more. That Jesus was gone. But more important for us today isn't the idea of "Jesus isn't here" as much as "Jesus isn't where you expected" that is important to us this blessed day.

I say this because being home is not what most of you would have had in mind for Easter. There would be sunrise and flowers. There would be breakfast and hugs. We would be filling these pews and singing. We would come here to celebrate our risen Savior. We might be missing that feeling right now. So I echo the words of the tomb. He is not here. He is risen! But what do I mean? That just as Christ being raised was more than just knowing the location of his body, Christ being raised is more than the location of his body, his people, now. That is to say, Christ isn't merely here or there, but Christ is wherever we are. That he transcended the grave, not that we would be tied to a location but that we would be tied to hope. Yes, I miss all of you. Yes, I wish we could be here today. But more than that, I'm excited. Because I know that we are bound together in life that transcends death. We are bound together in truth and in love. We are bound together with a bond that no distance can tear apart. We are together to celebrate that God is with us, even when we are not in the same room. We come together because Christ is risen no matter where we are.

Where was Jesus? Not in the tomb. But where was he? He was where his followers were! He was there on the road, appearing to the two women where they were. And his message? Go tell the others, and they will see me there. Go spread the news and I will be with them too. The message was that Christ would be where they would be. He would be with the people who needed him. That they didn't need to look in a tomb. That they didn't need to look in a specific place because he wasn't tied down to any specific place. He was wherever he was needed. He is wherever he is needed. He is wherever his followers are. I take a great comfort in that thought.

We gather together here, not because it is the only place where Christ is to be found, but we gather knowing that this is where we come to experience Christ together. But I want to remind you that we experience Christ together whenever we gather and how ever we gather. But we are still

together. If we can join together with those blessed saints that have gone on before us, surely, we can join together with our neighbors in spirit! We are still the church! We are still God's people. The sun still rose this morning. The tomb is still empty! Which means that we still have hope!

I want us all to take heed of that final command from today's Gospel lesson. Do not be afraid. Go and tell. Do not be afraid. Spread the news of your Messiah. Do not be afraid of what is going on. Praise the Lord that we still reside in God's grace! Do not be afraid of how long this will last. Celebrate that we are in God's glory! Do not be afraid! We are still the church! Do not be afraid! He is not here for he has been raised from the dead and indeed is going ahead of you! Christ will be wherever you are and wherever you go! He will be going ahead of that you may know that God is with you in love. That God is with you in abundant mercy.

The resurrection came only after the darkest of nights and the most troubling of days. The great joy was found not from joy upon joy but born from a great sorrow. Hope was not simply a matter of hearing or saying the right words. Hope was born from a community of believers sharing in the wondrous love of Christ. A community of believers huddled together in fear of what an uncertain future would bring. Not expecting the wonderful news they were about to receive. We may be in times that trouble our hearts, our minds, our bodies, our souls. But we have already tasted a bitter death. We share in Christ's death on the cross to share in his resurrection. We share in that beautiful life beyond life. We share in hope eternal in a love that is beyond measure. Given that we could be free! Free to care. Free to love. Free to give. Free to live.

Christ is Risen! He is not here, but he is everywhere! Do not be afraid! God is with us to the end of the age! God is with us in the dark and the light! God is with us this glorious morning, wherever we are! And God unites us across all divides, through any walls, bridging any distance. Because God is bigger than a place and a day! God is the God of all things! May the Lord bless you and keep you! May you be reminded of his steadfast love that endures forever! And may we always remember that Christ is with us. Yesterday. Today. Tomorrow. For eternity. No grave can trap that boundless joy, and that joy is in our hearts, always. Always. Amen. **Prayer of Confession and Pardon:** Lord, forgive us we pray. We come before you as those who have sinned against you in what we say and do. We come before you as those who have sinned against you in what we do not say and what we do not do. It is in our doings and our failings that we seek your grace and your mercy. We haven't loved you how we should. We haven't loved each other how we should. We are a people who are sorry, who humbly seek your forgiveness. Help us to live with one another in your mercy and your grace. Let us always remember the sacrifice made by our Risen Savior, Jesus Christ, that we may understand your deep love for us. May we honor that love by sharing it with one another, loving as you love and caring as you care. Help us to be of one body redeemed by one blood, serving one God. Amen.
